Living in the heart of the alps, we needed gear to support our adventure goals this summer. Both of us were looking to add a few items to our gear library.

Backpacks:

The criteria for our new backpacks was that they needed to be around 20L, Lilly needed a pack with a shorter women's torso, and we both wanted good support for long hiking days. A place to mount our hiking poles and water bladder was also a must!

Initially, we were wooed by the Mammut Ducan packs, but Lilly was disappointed by the lack of colour options in the women's sizing.

We were very happy to stumble on the Rab Protium during one of our (many) Transa visits. One of the staff members fitted the bags perfectly for us (a very adjustable bag) and it was a lot more comfortable than the Mammut Duncan packs for

both of us. In the end, we decided to purchase the Rab Protium! Lilly is very happy with the purple colour of the bag.

Trail Runners:

The highlight of their trip was visiting the Top of Europe.


Hiking in Switzerland has been quite the contrast compared to North America. There is almost always cell service, a restaurant (and maybe a bar), and a cable car to bring you down when doing outdoor activities here.

An extreme example of this is the top of Europe experience. Over a century ago, some people decided to dig a tunnel through Eiger. And now, we can take a train that takes you up to an elevation just shy of 3500 m.

It is a bit expensive mind you, but the view is well worth every penny. It was during a heat wave in Bern, with temperatures at around 30 degrees, but here, it was close to 0!

The view was impeccable and we were able to hike in the snow in the middle of summer. We walked to the Mönchsjochhütte and back, and even saw fighter jets fly above us.

Since it is Switzerland, they also had to build a watch store there, which is the tallest one in the world.

The Cheese Quest: Four cheeses, one prize with three months to complete an epic journey throughout Switzerland.

A big goal for us this summer was to complete the infamous Swiss Cheese Quest. Equipped with a passport, we have to visit all four cheese museums — Emmental (what us Canadians consider "Swiss Cheese"), Einsiedeln, Appenzellerland, and Gruyères — to receive a free Grand Tour Snack Box with free cheese and a Swiss army knife.

This knife is no average knife, it is purposefully designed for cheese! It has a fondue fork, cheese blade, wine opener, and a bread knife; all essentials for cheese-related gatherings.



Einsiedeln:

Our first visit was to the small town of Einsiedeln. We did not spend too much time at this stop and instead enjoyed a day exploring Zurich old town (which is relatively nearby)! We bought this cheese with a cute cat logo!

Emmental:

Our second visit was to the cheese museum closest to Bern
— Emmental! This was another

quick stop where we enjoyed the views of local farms. We also purchased some Emmental and used it to make ham + cheese sandwiches for lunch the next week!

Gruyère:

A slight obstacle was in our way to visiting this museum — train construction! But it was worth the wait as one of our favourite stops of the quest!

Our day started by completing the 17 km "Sentier des Fromageries". Once we were done, we were hungry and began our ascent to the medieval town of Gruyères. We saw the castle and stumbled into a spaceship at the HR Giger bar. This bar was designed by the artist who did the visuals in *Alien*.



Appenzell:

Appenzell was far from Bern, so we spent two days there to justify the long journey. It was well worth it! We spent a day hiking where we saw a cliff refuge along with a church in the mountain.

The next day was spent visiting the old Appenzell town along with completing our cheese quest. To our surprise, the Appenzell cheese factory was not where we expected. Instead of being in the old town of Appenzell, the factory was near St-Gallen. We just made it before they closed for the day!

St-Gallen was the cleanest town we had ever stepped foot in. We even saw McDonald's employees cleaning up the town on a Sunday. For the cherry on top, we got to travel in first class on our return to Bern!

Kandersteg Via Ferrata


One of our goals this summer was to try a via ferrata. In the end, we tried two — one in Mürren and Kandersteg — and we did this all in one weekend!

The Mürren via ferrata is often considered one of Switzerland's most "thrilling experiences" and so we wanted to start with this one. It has a K3 difficulty (German classification), which implies that there may be long exposed passages, and that we should have a head for heights, and some endurance. It had obstacles like, overhanging ladders, a cliff walk, tightropes, and a suspension bridge.



We ended up finding the Mürren via ferrata a little bit too easy. It was a fun experience, but with our background, it was closer to hiking than rock climbing. We thought that we were ready for the Kandersteg via ferrata — a K4 difficulty.


The Kandersteg via ferrata is along a 350 m high wall with lots of exposure. Shortly after the start, the K4 difficulty becomes clear. The route has long sections between anchors. Very quickly our adrenaline was spiking. We had to decide if we wanted to continue.



After the first vertical climb, we had to traverse along these iron rods. Then we got to the infamous 180 degree turning ladder! This was a really cool point of the climb.

We also crossed rope bridges, overhanging ladders, and a zipline!

In the end, we completed the climb safely and we really enjoyed ourselves. If we come back to Switzerland for longer periods of time, we plan to get our own via ferrata kits!







QUARTERLY BOOKS





BUDDY READS:

Felix and I read 4 books (971 pages) together this quarter! On average, we gave them a 3.75/5 rating.


